# **BRIDGING THE GAPS**



### RIDE UNITED

Ride United is bridging transportation gaps in our community by offering FREE, pre-scheduled, round-trip Lyft rides to ensure Martin County residents can access essential resources and opportunities like doctor's appointments, job interviews and legal hearings. Since launching in 2022, the program has provided more than **5,600 rides**, saving the community over \$100,000 in transportation fees.

### **HOLIDAY PROJECT**

For 35 years, United Way has spread holiday cheer by providing toys and holiday meals to local children and families in need through the Toys For Tots Holiday Project. This past year, **3,729 children** and **833 families** had the opportunity to unwrap **17,605 toys,** including a **record breaking 523 bikes** this holiday season!





### VITA

Through the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program, eligible Martin County residents receive free, IRS-certified tax preparation to maximize their refunds. In 2024, VITA processed **333 tax returns**, saving clients over **\$91,575**, putting more money back into the community.

### STUDENTS UNITED

Students United empowers local high school students to lead through service, providing opportunities to engage in volunteer work and create a lasting impact in Martin County. This year, **15 students** dedicated **302 hours** to serving their community, fostering leadership and a passion for giving back.





### **LEADERS UNITED**

Leaders United brings together passionate young professionals in Martin County to network, grow and give back through volunteerism and community impact. This year, **11 members** contributed **297 hours** of service, making a difference where it matters most.
